

Discussion Questions (provided by Shannon Bowring!)

- 1. What role does place play in The Road to Dalton? How does it set tone, inform plot, and shape characters?
- 2. Why does the author tell this story through multiple perspectives? How does this structure reflect the book's setting?
- 3. Which characters do you most relate to? Which characters do you struggle with?
- 4. The Road to Dalton is set in an often-overlooked part of Maine. How does Northern Maine challenge your ideas of the Maine that is usually visible in books and movies?
- 5. In what way does Dalton itself contribute to Bridget's decline into mental crisis? What clues did other characters miss in the lead-up to her suicide? Could it be argued that in a different place or time, Bridget's PTSD and postpartum depression may have been recognized and treated?

- 6. Given the setting and time period in this novel, is it possible the people of Dalton recognize the romantic relationship between Bev and Trudy but pretend not to? Were the book set in 2024, how might this reaction differ? How might it stay the same?
- 7. How do your perceptions of Richard and Trudy, and Bev and Bill shift as the details of their marriages unfold?
- 8. Every major character in the story carries at least one secret. How (and why) does the environment of Aroostook County, Maine in the 1990s dictate that those secrets remain untold?
- 9. In The Road to Dalton, many kinds of trauma take place--suicide, infidelity, abuse, and depression. Despite this, the story feels hopeful. How did the author accomplish this?
